Getting to Brock University

In Canada

Take the Niagara-bound Queen Elizabeth Way (QEW) to the 406 South Port Colbourne cut-off. Exit at St. David's Road West and you'll drive right on to the campus.

From the Toronto Airport:

From Highway 401 West, take Highway 403 South to the QEW in the direction of Hamilton. Follow the QEW west around the lake, then southeast to St. Catharines. At Exit 49, turn onto Highway 406 and continue until you reach St. David's Road. Take the St. David's Road West Exit (Highway 71) and follow until you reach Glenridge Avenue.

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Once at Brock University

To reach Earp Residence, turn right onto Glenridge Avenue. Turn left at the first set of lights onto University Road and then bear right onto Ray Woodfield Drive, then left onto Residence Road which will bring you to the residences.

Accommodation Information

Earp Residence (Group rate) Adult (18+) - \$34.00 per person per night (\$38.08 incl. taxes).

The Earp Residence opened its doors for the first time in September 2001. It can accommodate 255 guests in single occupancy rooms with a four-piece washroom shared between two rooms. Each of the five "houses" has a large furnished common lounge area. The Earp Residence contains an elevator, fire-place lounge and laundry rooms.

Accommodations in the Earp Residence are available for guests with special needs. Smoking is prohibited anywhere in the Earp Residence. Rooms in the Earp Residence have special features including visual fire alarms and washrooms which are accessible for guests with physical disabilities.

Conference Centre

The Brock University Conference Centre is open 24 hours per day. Guests should leave the following telephone number with family and work should they wish to be contacted while at Brock: (905) 688-5550, ext 3369. Please leave the name of the conference or program that you are attending for faster identification.

Residence Service

While the weather in the spring and summer in the Niagara Region ranges from 20 to 30 degrees Celsius, guests should bring clothing for both cool and warm weather along with rain gear. All bedrooms are equipped with full linens as well as a range of amenities and guests should bring personal toiletries, an alarm clock and a bathrobe. A small number of irons, ironing boards, alarm clocks and other accessories are available for use upon request.

Additional Amenities

A convenience store is open throughout the week on campus, and personal items such as toothbrushes, toothpaste and other items are available for sale from the Conference Centre front desk.

Three ATM (automated teller machines) are available on campus and are serviced by the Bank of Nova Scotia and the Royal Bank of Canada.

Access to a computer is available for guests to check their personal e-mail 24 hours a day.

Telephones are provided in every bedroom, allowing guests to make complimentary local calls and room-to-room calls. Long distance calls may be received at no charge, however, outgoing long distance calls may be made using pre-paid long-distance calling cards which are available for sale from the front desk.

Parking

Complimentary parking is provided to all residents in a lot convenient to each residence, although guests must pick up a parking pass upon arrival to access such lots. The use of this pass does not allow parking in fire lanes, spaces marked for the physically challenged or other restricted areas.

CREATING AN ON-LINE EXHIBITION

Creating real space exhibitions featuring archival materials can help to promote awareness and use of a special or specific collection and to enhal ce visibility for your archival facility. Why not go one step further and prepare a virtual exploration of your institution and its holdings to extend your audience beyond your walls? Participants will learn how to plan, develop and execute web-based exhibitions using key tools such as a project management cycle, a site architecture diagram, storyboard writing, and new media techniques to develop an effective on-line exhibition. Discover approaches to stories, voices and objects in conjunction with design considerations; educational activities and collections access objectives, and learn ways to pay for, and market, your exhibit.

Melissa Rombout is a curatorial specialist and a founder of ARTFX, a multimedia design consortium. Athough she has worked in the domain of cultural analysis, education, and heritage preservation for over 15 years, her main area of expertise is in the planning and development of dynamic real space and virtual space interactive exhibitions and explorations. She has been a pioneer in the development and construction of innovative web sites for heritage and cultural collections and has a successful career in the installations. Among these is the acclaimed study of the photography of Yousuf Karsh, *Karsh: Faces of the Twentieth Century*. As well, Melissa is a specialist in the interpretation of historical and contemporary Canadian photography and has a body of published academic literature.

Melissa is a Research Associate at the School for Studies in Art and Culture, Carleton University (Ottawa, Canada); New Media Advisor to the Department of Art and Music, Simmons College (Boston, Massachusetts); and Member of the Amsterdam School for Studies in Cultural Analysis.

At present, she is working as an interpretive specialist for the new Canadian War Museum and on two exhibitions for the Canadian Museum of Civilization in Hull: a large scale exhibition about the adaptations of Western Arctic Inuit; as well Zone 4 of the First Peoples Hall depicting aboriginal history since the contact with Europeans.
