FOCUS GROUPS UPDATE

Great News! We have completed seven web-based English-speaking focus groups with a total of 36 participants across 3 regions in Canada (Ontario & Quebec, East Coast, and West Coast & Central Canada) during summer of 2021. During the month of December we also conducted 3 web-based french-speaking focus groups with a total of 21 participants in order to obtain the experiences of our francophone African/Black communities during the COVID-19 pandemic.

We had the opportunity to conduct these focus groups with essential service workers, front-line healthcare workers, and community leaders who were excited to contribute to collecting critical data to support African/Black communities.

Research, research, research!

Preliminary findings

Since the launch of our national survey, we have examined and gathered some preliminary statistics to showcase a glimpse of our current findings. These statistics have been selected because they reflect the reality of how COVID-19 has impacted African/Black communities in Canada.



of Black essential workers participating in our national survey responded that their work became more stressful during COVID-19.

When Black people living in Canada were asked if they were treated differently at work based on being African/Black more than 52% surveyed, responded yes.





of survey respondents shared that they have experienced violence/discrimination during COVID-19.

When African/Black people in Canada were asked whether they trusted that their healthcare system would treat them fairly during COVID-19, 60.3% responded that they did not trust the healthcare system.





of survey respondents has families abroad impacted by COVID-19.
