## About this Initiative

Vision: Increase representation of Black professionals in health-related fields

WHO?
Eligible Black students in Health (Global Health, Health Studies, Kinesiology \& Health Science, Psychology)

## WHAT?

Get work-related experience by enrolling in a placement course. Receive 3.0 academic credit and a $\$ 1500$ stipend for work at the placement organization.

WHEN?
July 4 -August 24, 2023*

## About the Placement Course

## About the Placement

- Designed to give you a taste of projects and work related to the health sector under the direction of a field supervisor
- Takes place primarily on-site at the organization
- Requires you to complete a minimum of $\mathbf{1 0 0}$ hours in total for the term
- Work the equivalent of 2 days per week, Monday to Friday during general business hours (e.g., 8:30 am-4:30 pm)



## Placement Examples

- Support planning and implementation of a health promotion event at a community health centre
- Develop infographics for annual reports or other documents for an NGO
- Develop a survey to understand client or staff experiences in an organization
- Support quality improvement initiatives in a hospital
- Support research-related tasks (e.g., recruit participants for a research study, enter and organize data, contribute to an environmental scan)

To be eligible, you must fulfill all the following criteria:

## General Eligibility Criteria for all students

$\checkmark$ Self-identify as Black
$\checkmark$ Full-time or part-time student
$\checkmark$ Canadian Citizen, permanent resident, person to whom refugee protection has been conferred under the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act*
$\checkmark$ Legally entitled to work in Canada in accordance with the relevant provincial or territorial legislation and regulations
$\checkmark$ Available to work equivalent of 2 days per week, Monday to Friday during general business hours (e.g., 8:30 am-4:30 pm) - a minimum of 100 hours in total for the term.

| Prerequisite Courses | Must have completed all the following: <br> KINE 2049 - Research Methods in Kinesiology <br> KINE 2050 - Analysis of Data in Kinesiology I <br> At least 5 PKIN courses |
| Additional Eligibility Criteria | The maximum number of Independent Study Course (KINE 4060) credits <br> is 24 credits. <br> - A max of 12 Independent Study Course credits may be taken within <br> the last 30 credits of your degree |

## Global Health

| Total number of credits completed by end of $\mathbf{W}$ term | At least 56 credits |
| Prerequisite Courses | Must have completed all the following: <br> GH 1010-Foundations of Global Health Studies <br> GH 1001 \& 1002- Anatomy \& Physiology for Human Health I \& II <br> GH 2000-Global Health Policy: Power and Politics <br> GH 2010-Methods and Approaches in Global Health Research <br> GH 2200-Determinants of Health: Local to Global <br> Must have completed at least one of the following: <br> GH 3000-Epidemiology and Global Health <br> GH 3100-Communicable Diseases and Care <br> GH 3545-Promoting Global Health <br> GH 3740-Health Care Planning for Communities |
| Additional Eligibility Criteria | Eligible to take an Independent Study Course: The max number of IndependentStudy Course credits is 18 . A max 12 of those credits may be within the last 30 credits of the degree. A max of 12 credits may be with the same faculty member. |

## Psychology

| Degree type/program | Honours or non-honours <br> Psychology majors only |
| Total number of credits <br> completed by end of W term | At least 72 credits |
| Prerequisite Courses | Must have completed all the following: <br> PSYC 1010: Introduction to Psychology <br> PSYC 2010: Writing in Psychology <br> PSYC 2030: Introduction to Research Methods |
| Additional Eligibility Criteria | At least one of the following: <br> PSYC 2020: Statistical Methods I and II <br> PSYC 2021: Statistical Methods I |
| Students should not have previously participated in the CEWIL <br> funded experience (i.e., WIL for Black Students in Psychology in <br> Summer 2022) |  |

## Selection Criteria

## How will candidates be selected?

- Total of 5 available spots per program
- Priority for senior-level students (e.g., have completed most of your 3000 level courses)
- Students who have not had a similar prior experience (e.g., placement, or healthrelated work or volunteer experience)


## Placement Course Timeline

## Before the Placement <br> (now-early July)

## During the Placement <br> (July 4-August 24)

- Enroll in independent study course for S2 term (3.0 credit)
- Complete risk management/screening requirements
- Attend preparatory workshops (up to 4 hours total)


## WORK

- Complete orientation/training
- Support project through specific tasks
- Min 100 hrs/total


## COURSE

- Develop Learning Plan
- Attend check-in meetings
- Write reflection entries
- Prepare and submit poster
- Attend debrief workshop


## Before the Placement:

## Risk <br> Management

- Placement organizations require students to complete specific screening requirements before they begin a placement
- All selected students must complete and submit:
- Vulnerable Sector Screening
- Immunization records (e.g., COVID-19, Varicella, Tuberculosis, etc.)
- Additional requirements (e.g., Mask Fit test)
- These requirements often have associated fees
- Instructions for completion will be shared with selected students


## Before/After the

 Placement:
## Finances

- You will still pay regular course fees, so consider financial aid/OSAP timelines and implications
- For questions related to OSAP, connect directly with Student Financial Services
- Upon completion of the placement, you will receive a $\$ 1500$ stipend
- Intended to offset associated costs and fees (e.g., risk management requirements)
- Details for deposit of stipend will be shared with the selected students


## Before the Placement:

- Enrollment in the Independent Study* course is by permission of the Faculty Advisor
- In Psychology, this is referred to as an Individual Research Project (IRP)
- Health Studies students will enroll in a KINE or GH Independent Study Course
- The process for enrollment varies by program
- Selected students will receive specific enrollment instructions at the time of acceptance


## During the Placement: Faculty Advisor Role

- Learning is self-directed: you identify Learning Goals and work towards achieving them
- Faculty Advisor oversees and assesses your learning:
- Helps you make links with what you have learned throughout your program
- Regular Check-ins
- Assigns you a grade
- Total of 5 direct contact hours



## During the Placement: Supervisor Role

- Likely the person you will interact with the most throughout the experience
- Serves as your main point of contact in the organization
- Along with other staff members in the organization, the supervisor:
- Creates a welcoming environment for you
- Onboards and orients you in the organization
- Identifies the project you will support

- Supervises and gives ongoing feedback


## EE Coordinators' Role

The Experiential Education Coordinators are your first point of contact in the University and will:

- Assign you a placement
- Provide preparatory training
- Regularly check in with you
- Provide a student guide with resources
